IMPROVING QUALITY OF CARE

Shuswap Hospital Foundation president Dr. Darren Lorenz is proud of how the board of directors works together to improve the quality of care provided in Salmon Arm.

Looking at recent acquisitions, Dr. Lorenz says the CT scanner installed last November is a critical component in the care doctors and staff are able to provide.

“In this day and age it really is a necessity. Without it, we would not be able to treat certain conditions such as strokes,” he says, noting parts and company support were no longer available for the old scanner. “The new one is far superior, with much improved diagnostic accuracy.”

Dr. Lorenz says another important acquisition this year was two new Slimline colonoscopes.

“Having new technologies and the right equipment is essential to providing high quality care to patients,” he says.

The next big-ticket item for the hospital is the new mammography unit. The installation was delayed due to the need for extensive renovations. This work is due to begin in the new year, with the sophisticated machine scheduled to be operational in the fall of 2023. “Once it’s up and running, people won’t have to

drive to Vernon, Kamloops or Kelowna for diagnostic imaging.”

As a physician and president of the Foundation board, Dr. Lorenz says he is very aware of the challenges in every aspect of care.

“The hospital is growing and is well-supported by the Interior Health Authority. “We have the opportunity to participate in shaping the services we need in this community.”

Dr. Lorenz believes the Foundation has been successful in helping to make many of the new improvements possible.

In terms of his position on the board of the Foundation, Dr. Lorenz says he has the opportunity to work with amazing community leaders.

“The board members all have such unique attributes. Everyone has different backgrounds such as finance, business, law, health and accounting and I love being part of an organization that can effectively and efficiently be a part of improving services,” he says. “We have two physicians on the board and our value is being able to provide an understanding of why the equipment is being requested, as well as its impact to the hospital and community.”

The Foundation receives requests from the health authority as well as from doctors and staff. “We are in constant communication with IHA administration to get as much information as we need,” says Dr. Lorenz, pointing out members of an executive committee continually consider the direction in which the Foundation needs to go.

As well, the board has begun inviting speakers on a quarterly basis to share their specialties.

“We are always trying to engage and learn because it helps us to make decisions on what type of equipment is in most need of funding,” he says, noting the Foundation was paramount in getting a cardiac rehab program up and running.

Dr. Lorenz calls Foundation Director of Development Fiona Harris and her assistant Trudy te Hennepe the heart of the Foundation.

Dr. Lorenz is proud that members of the community showed such amazing support that the Foundation’s \$3.3 million fundraising goal set in January 2021 was met by the end of August 2022. He is looking forward to continuing support as the Foundation’s annual fundraising campaign begins mid-November.

SURGICAL UPGRADES



Dr. Stephen Hiscock

Every year, almost as many women in British Columbia die from colon cancer as from breast cancer.

While lung cancer is the number-one cancer killer in Canada, colon cancer is in second place.

“It’s preventable,” says Shuswap Hospital surgeon Dr. Stephen Hiscock, who notes that death from an obstructing colon cancer can be awful.

He says local surgeons are thrilled the Shuswap Hospital Foundation has provided the OR with two new slimline colonoscopes worth some \$40,000 each for use in colonoscopies.

“BC has developed a fantastic screening program, and we have shown a number of decreases in colon cancer over the past 10 years or so,” he says. “The data is solid, high-quality, and irrefutable.” Dr. Hiscock says there are six doctors in Salmon Arm who perform colonoscopies

The slimline colonoscopy is a thinner scope which makes it a lot easier to go around tough corners,” he says, noting women, particularly those who have had a hysterectomy, have rough corners. “What that means is the risk of perforation is decreased by having these slimline scopes.”

Dr. Hiscock also expressed gratitude to local company Ark Masonry for providing the extra funding of \$7,699 needed to include the scope guide that tells surgeons exactly where they are along the path of the colon.

SURGICAL UPGRADES

“It is extremely helpful because the colon can be difficult to navigate,” he says, calling the guide an excellent instructional tool teaching UBC surgical residents how to perform colonoscopies.

“The last thing we want to do is miss a polyp or cancer, so we’re always trying to improve.”

Three surgical residents per year spend two months at a time at Shuswap Lake General. Dr. Hiscock is proud that their skills are so improved that when they return to the Lower Mainland, they are able to perform colonoscopies under supervision.

Prior to the arrival of the two new scopes a few months ago, there were five colonoscopes in the operating room but only one of them was slimline. It takes 45 minutes to clean one, so the addition of two new scopes means doctors can look after more people, more efficiently.

“We got two new colonoscopes at a little over \$40,000 per piece. They’re just a gorgeous, gorgeous piece of equipment.”

Hiscock says on average, eight to 10 colonoscopies are performed a day in the OR, Monday through Friday, which adds up to about 2,600 per year.

Everyone between the ages of 50 to 75 should ask their doctor about the Fecal Immunochemical Test (FIT), which can determine if a colonoscopy is recommended.

Dr. Hiscock says most colon cancer begins with little polyps, which are removed during a colonoscopy. Larger masses are biopsied and, if required, surgically removed in the OR shortly thereafter.

“I can’t celebrate our Hospital Foundation enough; it is rock solid and makes our job doable,” he says. “We are very blessed.”



NEW IN ICU



Three key pieces of equipment provided by the Shuswap Hospital Foundation over the past year have enhanced care, and in some cases increased comfort to hospital patients.

A \$16,177 state-of-the-art bed for the intensive care unit (ICU) provides benefits to both patients and nursing staff, says Robbi Kirichenko, Clinical Operations Manager of Acute Care.

Previous beds were outdated, uncomfortable and harder for staff to manoeuvre.

Not only is the new ICU bed's higher quality mattress more comfortable, it reduces the risk for bed sores.

"This is especially important in the critically ill as they are often immobile or have very limited mobility," Robbi says. "And the multiple positions allow nursing staff to more easily re-position patients in bed, causing themselves less physical strain.

Patients can also make themselves more comfortable as they can easily and independently adjust the bed to several different positions. The high-tech bed can even play calming music and allows patients to be weighed without having to take them out of the bed.

The benefits extend beyond patient comfort. The bed is lighter and much easier for nursing and housekeeping staff

to move throughout the ICU," Robbi says.

Another win-win for patients and nursing staff is the new emergency room stretcher.

Like the ICU bed, the high-tech stretcher has a better quality mattress, providing comfort and reducing the risk of bed sores while the patient is waiting in ER.

Again, patients can use the electronic function to find the position they find most comfortable.

"Before, they would have had to call the nurse to help with repositioning, such as moving the head of the bed up," says Robbi.

Benefits to staff of this \$12,361 stretcher are similar to the ICU bed. Patients can be weighed without having to move them from the stretcher, repositioning a patient is easier and requires less effort and the stretchers are lighter and easier to move patients through the hospital.

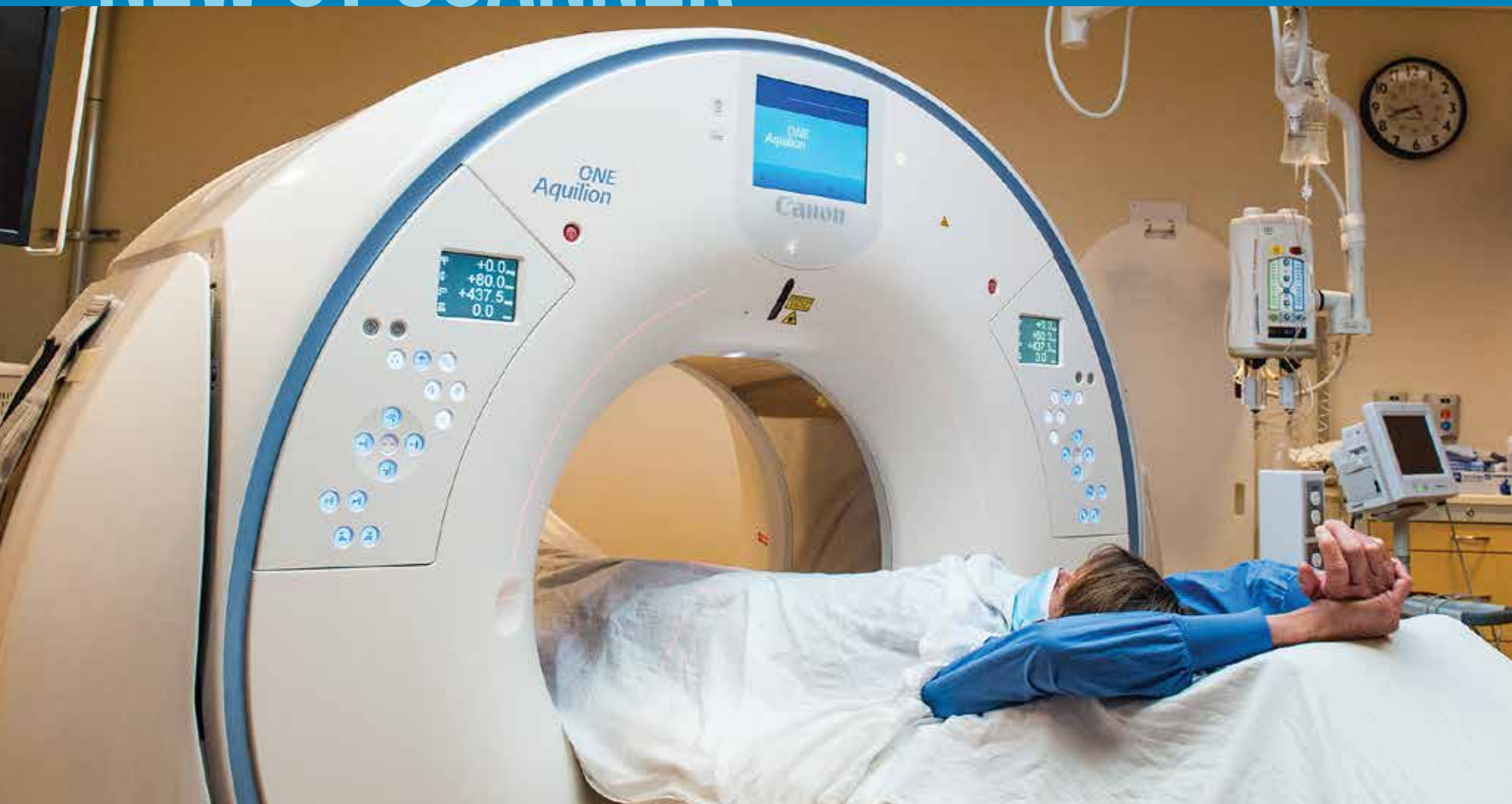

NEW CT SCANNER



The phrase “A picture is worth a thousand words” was first used in a 1921 advertising trade magazine.

And nowhere is the importance of a clear image more paramount than to the doctors and staff in Shuswap Lake General Hospital’s Imaging Department.

The \$2 million CT scanner that was installed last November has been getting rave reviews.

Almost 10,000 patients have already been scanned, a number that is expected to reach 13,000 by the one-year anniversary. “We have been getting great feedback from specialists around the region, especially for CT angiography, which looks

at blood vessels in the heart, brain and body,” says Kim Mead, Practice Lead in the imaging department.

Medical Imaging Director Dr. Anthony Stregger says the scanner provides better image quality, making it easier for radiologists to find abnormalities.

Not only are the images clearer, the Canon CT scanner has applications the old one was unable to provide.

For example, prior to the new scanner, doctors might have suspected a patient had gout, but no definitive answers were provided. The new scanner actually produces a coloured image of the actual crystal, leaving no doubt the patient has gout.

“We’re waiting for a chip upgrade that has already been purchased and will increase the way we can image patients with CT,” says Dr. Stregger. “And further upgrades are coming that will actually expand more in the future.”

Shuswap Lake General Hospital’s Imaging Department employs five radiologists and 10 trained staff on the scanner.

LEADING-EDGE EQUIPMENT

Scheduled appointments take place between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m., but on-call staff is available 24-seven for in-patient care and emergencies.

“We take CT referrals from all over the Interior Health region,” says Kim Mead. “Our waitlist is one of the lowest in IHA so we provide support to surrounding communities.”

Not only are radiologists impressed with the quality of the images, they are able to read them from home.

“That’s a big change brought on by COVID when radiologists were encouraged to work from home,” says Dr. Stregger.

Both Kim Mead and Dr. Stregger appreciate the support they receive from the Shuswap Hospital Foundation.

“The department has benefitted tremendously over the years; we have some of the best equipment,” says Kim Mead. “For being a small town, we’re leaders in the equipment we have and the types of exams we are able to perform.”



MAMMOGRAPHY UNIT UPDATE

An old X-ray room at Shuswap Lake General Hospital will be getting new life in 2023!

Renovations will begin in the new year to make way for the installation of a state-of-the-art mammography unit.

The new unit will perform screening mammograms so women will be able to go directly to Shuswap Lake General Hospital rather than having to travel out of town.

Doctors and staff are also excited that once the mammography unit is up and running, they will be able to provide a full complement of care, from diagnostic screening through to surgery, if necessary.

“What it allows us to do is diagnostic mammograms, screening mammograms and what we call stereotactic biopsies for suspicious calcifications, and guided wire localization on the day of surgery,” says Medical Imaging Director Dr. Anthony Stregger. “It will be really great; it’s good for us, the department and the community to expand services and save people a lot of driving around, especially in the winter.”

Once the mammography department is operational, every step of the diagnostic/treatment process - from lump detection to imaging work-up to surgery and post-surgical imaging - can be provided locally.

Dr. Stregger says another benefit to patients is that they will no longer need to go on the waiting lists of

other hospitals for any part of their treatment.

“This will expedite treatment for our patients and will provide relief for our neighbouring hospital’s waitlists,” he says. “Adding the service in Salmon Arm will benefit the entire region.”

Dr. Stregger says, with the addition of new services and increased workload the department will be looking into hiring an additional Radiologist with a Fellowship in Women’s Imaging.

As always, doctors and staff are grateful to the Shuswap Hospital Foundation for making acquisition of the new mammography unit and other advanced equipment possible.

The Foundation is paying 75 per cent or \$1.4 million of the total \$1.9 million cost of the machine, renovations and installation combined.

Five new sockeye salmon will be installed on the Recognition Wall at Shuswap Lake General Hospital.

Just before he died on Aug. 19, 2021, 71-year-old Rob Graham told Arlene Jones that he wished to donate \$50,000 to the Shuswap Hospital Foundation.

Arlene, Rob's wife of 30 years, said he would like to donate money to the hospital in memory and honour of family members.

One sockeye salmon plaque will bear the name of his late mother and father Charlie and Lil Graham. His brother and sister-in-law Gary and Carol Graham will be memorialized on a second fish and a third sockeye will bear the names of the late Lester and Anna Mae Jones.

Although still very much living, Arlene's name will be inscribed on



the same fish as her husband. The fifth sockeye will bear the names of Arlene's sister, Val, and her husband Tom.

"Neither of us had ever stayed in the hospital except for emergency room visits, Rob's chemotherapy and other day procedures," says Arlene. "He was very kind-hearted, a big guy with a good sense of humour. He didn't say why he wanted to leave money to the hospital, he just told me that's what he wanted to do."

A man who enjoyed laughing and teasing people, Rob was in the trucking industry for most of his career.

He had vintage vehicles and was a member of the Shuswap Vintage Car Club, including a favourite little hot rod named Just Awesome and a 1930 Model A.

RALPH OWENS

Giving back is a way of life for Ralph Owens.

"It's bred in me that we're here to serve," says the long-time Salmon Arm resident and former owner of Owens Travel Service.

Approaching his 91st birthday, Ralph became a member of the board when it was the Shuswap Lake General Hospital Foundation in 1985.

"I was invited to join the board and I said, sure, yeah, I can do what you've been doing, which is looking after the hospital," he says, noting that when he joined the board, department heads had to present a report once a month. "You knew what was going on in the hospital and that was really interesting. And to be a part of helping that along was heartwarming."

A lifetime member of the Shuswap Hospital Foundation, Ralph and his late wife, Norma, began donating before he joined the board.

"We started out small, and, now I have a bit more cash I give in memory of folks like Ralph and Addie Williams and Eddie Turner, who were good friends," says Ralph of his habit of making a donation in memory of family and friends. "And I make an annual donation."



Ralph explains that when a single or several donations reach \$5,000, a bronze sockeye salmon is added to the Recognition Wall located in the hospital. Ralph added a silver salmon plaque when the amount of his donations reached \$10,000 and is now due for a titanium salmon as his total reaches \$25,000.

"It's a heartwarming feeling donating to your fellow man, and the hospital is in desperate need of equipment the government doesn't provide," he says. "And that helps keep treatment for our people local."

Ralph is extremely active. After many years of playing and refereeing soccer, he still coaches young would-be referees.

He has supported many of the Foundation's fundraising events, including taking a turn in a kiosk at the Mall at Piccadilly when the annual campaign gets underway.

"I have always done a Christmas one that helps people with their taxes, as the more money you put into the hospital the bigger your rebate," he says. "I've been on the tables at Piccadilly since 1985 and I'll be there again this year."
